

The history of Luang Prabang can be traced back as far as the



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

fourth century when communities along the Mekong river began to form into townships, so called *muang*. This development culminated in the formation of the Lane Xang (million elephants)

Kingdom by King Fa Ngum. In 1345 A.D., Xien Thong – now known as Luang Prabang – was established as its capital. In the seventeenth century, the Kingdom entered its most illustrious era, establishing the first contacts with Europeans. During the 19th





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century Laos came under French influence until its independence in 1949.

Luang Prabang's rich history is evident in its architecture, a unique blend of Lao urban structures with those built by the European colonial authorities in the 19th and 20th centuries. Its unique, remarkably well-preserved townscape illustrates a key stage in the blending of these two distinct cultural traditions.

Set amidst three hectares of lush gardens, rich with bougainvillea, palms and frangipani, the Pansea offers 34 Laostyled accommodations and extraordinary mountain views, not to mention easy access to the town's numerous temples and

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religious sites. The hotel's spectacular infinity pool seemingly spills into the valley below, whilst overlooking Mount Phou Si and That Makmo: a Buddhist monument renowned for its massive, melon-shaped top.

These breathtaking views can also be enjoyed from the hotel's restaurant, which is adjacent to the infinity pool. On the menu is a selection of French specialties with exotic touches as well as traditional Lao dishes. "Every morning, our pastry chef bakes his own croissants, Danish pastries and baguettes," says Aung Ko Ko. For breakfast, guests can top these with the hotel's homemade jam which comes in such delectable flavors as tamarind, pineapple and papaya.

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Rooms are decorated with local crafts and cotton linens, and have balconies that look out over the surrounding countryside. Guests can relax on the daybeds on the balcony or have a private massage. The La R sidence Phou Vao will soon offer its guests a full range of massages and spa treatments when the spa, which is being built on the hotel grounds is completed in October. "Looking at the design it'll be the most beautiful spa of the all our hotels," enthuses Aung Ko Ko, Room Division Manager.
